
Mr. Switzer is talking about football, but we know that in our homes, we must be champions of recovery every day.



When I was in my active addiction my life was chaotic. In and out of jail, and prison since I was 18. The longest I was ever out was three months before I was arrested again. Always on the run with warrants. I never felt like I could slow down. Every time I got in trouble the crimes I committed seemed to be getting worse. And all for a high, that was never enough. I slowly started to lose my family's support and they were done with me. With no one to turn to my life was at an all-time low.

What is your sobriety date? When did you move to Oxford House?

My sobriety date is 3/16/21. I moved into Oxford House on 1/27/22.

How has Oxford House been beneficial in your life?

Thanks to Oxford House and the 12 steps my life has turned around completely. My family is proud of me again. They want me home for the holidays. They don't worry about if I'm ok and if I'm going to be here tomorrow. I got a great job and can make taxable money. I have responsibility and accountability. Two things I didn't know I needed so badly till I got here.

What's your advice for the Newcomer?

My advice for the newcomer is to get involved with Oxford House. Go to chapter meetings and fundraisers and have a good time. Hopefully, you'll get drawn in the way I did and realize that this is what life's about. Helping others and staying sober.

My sobriety date is December 11, 2021, and I moved into Oxford house in March 2022.

How has Oxford House been beneficial in your life?

I needed a safe place to come home to. I knew I needed to be in a place that was safe for me to grow and to surround myself with like-minded people that had what I wanted. Today I come home to structure, accountability, and the support that I have been missing for a large part of my life.

What advice do you have for the newcomer?

Understand that growth is uncomfortable. Getting where u need to be and sustaining that life is hard and uncomfortable. Oxford Houses and the environment is set up for you to succeed in life. Following simple guidelines, you can build a foundation for yourself. One day you will be able to pass that same knowledge on to the next addict suffering and looking for what you have. The confidence and joy it brings to be able to share what was so freely given to you.

What was your life like before Oxford House?

Before Oxford House, my life was riddled with violence, drugs, incarceration, loss, and chaos. It lacked genuine connection with anyone and any real purpose.

What is your sobriety date. When did you move into Oxford House?

My clean date is July 10, 2019. I was released from prison on June 9th, 2020, and moved directly into Oxford House Regime.

How has Oxford House benefited your life?

Oxford has taught me a whole new way of life in my newfound freedom with structure and accountability through a fellowship of men and women on the same goal-driven path, who relate to my life experiences, and has taught me how to function in my roles of father, friend, brother, son, uncle and even in a society as a whole.

What is your advice for the newcomer?

Perspective is everything. Focus on the positive things and your goals. Always reach out, build relationships in recovery and work the steps with a sponsor.

"Oh, the places you'll go", do you remember Dr. Suess's book? I think back to that book often. My dad gifted me one when I graduated from high school in 2010. Little did I know the places I would go would not be where he imagined his little girl going.

After high school my addiction started to really take off, I had chosen not to go to college, and I was finally free! I went straight into full-blown active addiction I lived to get high, I was hopeless. Quickly my heroin and meth use led me to homelessness and a life of crime. One year after being released from prison I was on my way back.

I decided I didn't want to go back and with a glimmer of hope for a different life I sat in my cell and wrote a letter to my judge pleading with him to let me in the drug court program. I stated I had tried everything else, treatment had not worked, the prison had not worked and I needed to try something different.

It was not an easy road. I relapsed several times, I was horrible at time management and kept hanging around people who were still using. I was eventually sent to treatment; it was there I realized. I am not a bad person,

I can let people in. Through my 12- Step program, the guidance and structure of the drug court program, and the positive role models like Misty Hahn I have found in my beloved Oxford House Inc., I have had a psychic change. The promises are coming true in my life today and I am growing into the woman I always knew that I could be. It wasn't easy, but it was worth it.

NOW WE'RE COOKING





Ashley's Aubuelita's Salsa de Roja (Mexican Red Salsa)

Ingredients

4 Tomatillos

3 Roma Tomatoes

3 Jalapenos (use serrano peppers for extra spicy)

1/4 yellow onion

6 cloves of garlic

1 heaping tablespoon of Knorr Caldo de Pollo (chicken bouillon)

salt, pepper, garlic powder, onion powder to taste

1 can of tomato sauce (optional)

I can of tomato paste (optional)

Instructions

Wash your hands and all produce.

Remove husks from tomatillos, cut off the tops of your peppers, peel garlic cloves, peel, and cut a 1/4 of onion.

Fill a large pot with cold water. Put all produce in the pot and bring it to a boil.

Turn heat down to medium and continue to cook until tomatillos & peppers turn bright green.

Remove pot from heat and allow to cool.

Add all cooled ingredients to a blender with 1/2 cup of the water from the pot.

Add all seasonings from above. SEASON WITH YOUR HEART!

For Chunky salsa pulse the blender a few times

For a thin salsa blend for several minutes on high.

Is salsa too spicy? Tame it down with 1 can of tomato sauce or tomato paste.
